





Poised and Ready

Craig Wedderspoon 2004 Mild steel & stainless steel Convergence of Cambridge, Arlington & Devon roads



The **Poised and Ready** parkette development was made possible through the combined efforts of City Staff, UA Arts and the Cultural Arts Commission. The sculpture was installed to enhance a small, triangular public space at the convergence of Cambridge, Arlington and Devon roads. Created by Craig Wedderspoon, **Poised and Ready** was selected through a jury and community voting process in the summer of 2004.

Wedderspoon writes, "My current work addresses aspects of the human body and how it relates to, exists in and moves through the spaces that surround it. **Poised and Ready** is an illustration of the anticipatory tension that builds up from within the mind and body moments before the realization of a long-awaited goal. Consisting of half mild steel and half stainless steel, **Poised and Ready** is designed for an outdoor setting where it can thrive in the exposure to the elements and in turn, as the mild steel begins to rust, make its mark on time as it ages and shifts in color throughout the seasons."

Into the Woods

City of Upper Arlington, Cultural Arts & Tree Commissions, Haiku by Yvonne Hardenbrook Cardiff Woods Park, Cardiff & Berkshire Roads

Into the Woods is an artful enhancement of one of Upper Arlington's most treasured and intimate parks, Cardiff Woods Park, thanks to a partnership with the City's Cultural

Arts and Tree Commissions. Into the Woods features four simple granite benches, each engraved with the Latin names of four types of trees that can be found in the park. Additionally, a granite stone entryway to the park features Haiku poetry by local artist



Yvonne Hardenbrook. Park access

was also improved by enhanced mulched pathways.

Located in Southeast Upper Arlington, Cardiff Woods is a 1.9 acre natural wooded lot, with plants and trees native to Ohio. The site was dedicated to the City in 1924 in order to preserve a small nature reserve of sorts, in the midst of a beautiful residential neighborhood.

Initiated by the Parks & Recreation Strategic Plan Task Force, the City's Cultural Arts and Tree Commissions helped bring this delightful, natural project to fruition. We invite you to stop by and enjoy the beauty and serenity that can be found within the park.

All over the world artists and neighborhoods have been wrapping utility boxes in an effort to reduce graffiti and beautify their communities. Upper Arlington is taking part in this artful encounter with Outside the Box. Outside the Box includes the work of 10 juried artists and is located on utility boxes on Tremont Road, Lane Avenue and Northwest Blvd. The original artwork was featured in an Arlington Hall Gallery show at our Municipal Services Center to kick off this community-wide exhibition. Movement: Impressions of Upper Arlington

Jennifer Hines City of Upper Arlington, UA Arts Mallway Park, Arlington Avenue

In 1920, The Mallway opened as a cultural center of the City, featuring City Hall and several shops and businesses. This followed a period of time

when the site had been utilized as barracks for troops, shortly after the beginning of World War I. The area had to be rebuilt upon the end of the war. Today, the Mallway and surrounding park stand at the center of a thriving mixed-use district that is home to shops, restaurants and businesses, the Jones Middle School, Devon Pool, the Upper Arlington Schools Administration Building, and one of the City's fire stations - housed in the former City Hall.

The Mallway renovation project was initiated to repair sidewalks and enhance the park's landscaping. **Movement: Impressions of Upper Arlington** was commissioned as a means to reflect and incorporate the site's history since 1920 into the renovation work. Created by Jennifer Hines of Chicago, Illinois, Movement: Impressions of Upper Arlington incorporates imprinted images of Upper Arlington's history into the concrete pathways. You can find a soldier's boot



print, indents from a bicycle wheel and much more in this fun yet subtle historical tribute.

Elemental Gardens

Reed Road Park, 3855 Reed Road

The Elemental Gardens project consists of a sculpture garden at Reed Road Park, that will eventually include all four elements of Water (Egeria), Fire (pending project), Earth (Emerging Edafos) and Wind (Rotation).

The bosquet features **Rotation**, an abstract sculpture by C.Jeré and plantings placed by members of Leadership UA and Lisa Metcalf, City Horticulturist.

Steve Bush 2017 Metal

Ogun is the God of iron, energy, creativity, war, hunting and invention. This fierce warrior is one of the oldest Orishas and is pictured as a blacksmith as he's a powerful spirit of metal work. This last installation, by artist Steve Bush, is a metal sculpture depicting fire. Crediting the vision of the

City of Upper Arlington and the Cultural Arts Commission, this piece is the final installation of the garden, a creative endeavor of many community members that has taken 10 years to complete.



Egeria

Gene Friley 2009 Concrete



Another partnership with the Parks & Forestry Division resulted in **Egeria**, an interactive sculptural fountain created by local artist Gene Friley. Egeria was a Greek Goddess who gave wisdom and prophecy in return for simple libations of water. The fountain features a water pump, providing a "green" element to the sculpture. Visitors can pump water from an underground tank through to the fountain, sparing the need for electricity. Visitors may interact with the sculpture during the spring, summer and fall seasons, until water is drained for the winter (October–March).

Emerging Edafos

Cultural Arts, Parks & Forestry Soil and plant installation

Emerging Edafos is an installation created in a partnership between the Cultural Arts and Parks & Forestry Divisions. The initial concept for the Earth component came from a desire to change the face and topography of this small space. The three mounds represent a small but notable change, and all three fit together cohesively with turf type fescue planted in each, providing subtle texture to alter the space.
