

With the building exterior mostly complete, passersby no longer see the changes that are rapidly taking place at the Bob Crane Community Center construction site. Dry wall is in, paint is going on the walls, flooring is being installed, and each week our collective vision for our community's primary gathering spot is physically taking shape.

And we are pleased to report that this major project remains on schedule for a Spring 2025 opening.

Planning for opening day continues to be a top priority for the UA Parks & Rec team, and we have a few updates to share with you.

Parking Deck

A critical component for this exciting project is the construction of the new parking deck at the north end of the Giant Eagle parking lot. Plans are on track to complete this project and open the deck to the public in mid-November, in plenty of time for the Thanksgiving holiday.

Once complete, the 310 parking spaces within this structure will bring the total number of spaces at the Kingsdale redevelopment site to more than 900. We hope you enjoy this additional amenity, and we extend our sincere gratitude to the Kingsdale businesses and patrons for their patience as this project was undertaken.

Envision Henderson Corridor Planning Nears Completion



The Envision Henderson corridor planning process is set to wrap up in 2024 after collecting input from more than 800 residents and stakeholders. The process concluded its latest round of engagement in early October. The Community Choices discussions and online survey tested key priorities and ideas for the plan.

Concepts like the Henderson "Boulevard," the Northern Gateway, Live + Work Neighborhood redevelopment opportunities, and new sidewalk and trail connections scored highly among participants. Comments focused on the need to address safety concerns for drivers and pedestrians, while also improving landscaping and aesthetics. Participants in the second round of discussions made it clear that any redevelopment should reinforce the community's character. One commenter noted, "Ensure that new buildings are unique to Upper Arlington, not just any town in the USA."

Feedback from this second round will help shape the final direction and priorities of the corridor plan. Led by MKSK, the planning team will combine these insights with over 700 comments received during initial community meetings to develop a draft plan. The

plan will be reviewed by City Staff and presented to the community and City Council for consideration before the end of 2024.

Checking in on the Right-of-Way Transition

One unique issue running in parallel with the corridor planning process is a change in ownership of the road itself. In 2024, the cities of Columbus and Upper Arlington began discussions to transfer the deed and management of the stretch of Henderson Road from the Reed Road intersection to Stonehaven Drive.

In most cases, roads are maintained by a public entity like a city. While these entities must work within state and federal guidelines, they typically have authority to pursue capital improvement projects. Transferring the Henderson Road deed to the City of Upper Arlington is a critical first step for implementing the Envision Henderson corridor plan.

Moving into Implementation

The Envision Henderson plan will outline a priority action agenda to improve the safety, aesthetics, and functionality of the corridor. The plan identifies three key areas of action:

- City-Controlled Priorities: With the right-of-way transfer from Columbus, Upper Arlington will have full authority over the roadway. City staff can then create a capital investment schedule reflective of the priorities outlined in the Envision Henderson plan
- 2. City-Influenced Changes: The plan also identifies recommendations for areas where the City has influence but does not directly control the timing of changes. This includes potential redevelopment at the Northern Gateway and the Live + Work Neighborhood. These recommendations align community priorities with market and site realities, establishing a vision for what could be possible within the framework of the City's zoning code.
- 3. **Regional Trends and Initiatives:** Lastly, Envision Henderson will define UA's position within broader regional trends. In this area, the City can advocate for important projects and policies but has limited control over outcomes. This includes major policy changes from the City of Columbus, such as the Zone In project, adopted in August 2024, which reclassifies commercial zoning districts and increases density along the north side of Henderson. Similarly, the LinkUS project will impact the corridor. It will be critical for Upper Arlington to stay engaged and informed as these developments unfold.

The Envision Henderson planning process will conclude in 2024, with the City aiming

Highlights of City Council & Its Policy Decisions

2025-2026 Budget

The fall of each even numbered year marks a busy time for the City as departments develop their proposed budgets for the next two years. The results of that effort come before Council starting in November, with a series of public hearings that look at the different budget components.

The City's financial position remains strong, thanks to several interrelated factors that include:

- The leadership of past and present City Councils that have guided reviews, updates and adherence to strong fiscal policies and financial accountability practices;
- The cumulative effect of a proactive economic development program, which is diversifying and strengthening the business community.

The proposed 2025-2026 budget is reflective of conservative revenue projections that align with the current economic climate, while positioning the City to be able to continue providing a high level of services and reinvestment in the 10-Year Capital Improvement Program, relative to streets, sidewalks,

waterlines, sewers, parks and other public infrastructure.

Dates for the budget hearings are as follows:

- Monday, November 4 Budget Summary Presentation
- Monday, November 18 first budget discussion (Capital Improvement Program)
- Monday, December 2 second budget discussion (Operating, Capital Equipment, Schedule of Fees)

- Monday, December 9 third budget discussion (open items), First Reading Budget Amendments
- Monday, December 16 Second Reading, Council Vote

Holiday Fire Safety Reminders

As we head into the fall and winter months, Upper Arlington residents will be celebrating several holidays. Those holidays often combine decorations and candles with large family gatherings, cooking and alcohol. This can be a dangerous combination. The Upper Arlington Fire Division wants you to celebrate safely, so please consider the following tips:

- Use battery operated candles, if possible.
- Keep decorations away from open flames and other heat sources.
- Keep lighters, matches and candles away from small children and pets.
- Blow out candles when leaving the

room or going to bed.

- If a candle must burn continuously, make sure it is in a glass container and placed on a metal tray or in a deep basin filled with water.
- Remain in the kitchen when cooking on the stove top.
- Make sure holiday lights are used per the manufacturer's directions.
- Keep Christmas trees well-watered, away from heat sources and turn off lights when going to bed.
- Close before you doze: close bedroom doors when sleeping (see a video at https://www.youtube. com/watch?v=bSP03BE74WA).
- ABOVE ALL: Ensure all smoke

detectors are in place and working properly.

2025 Community Relations Innovation Small Grant Program

Applications Accepted: November 1-December 14, 2024

The City will begin accepting applications for the 2025 grant cycle for the Community Relations Innovation Small Grant Program on November 1. This program is designed to create opportunity spaces for new initiatives, and enhancements to existing community programs and events that advance the welcoming and inclusion goals of the Community Relations Committee.

Grants of \$1,000-\$5,000 are awarded to organizations seeking funding for projects that will achieve one or more of the following goals:

- Increase knowledge, understanding, and appreciation of diversity within UA and throughout Central Ohio.
- Increase the number, type, and quality of positive interactions by non-residents with the UA community.

 Increase the sense of belonging and inclusion of all UA citizens with special focus on non-majority residents and those without preexisting connections to UA.

Past year recipients have included the Culture & Artisans Fair at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Equal UA's Porch Parties, the UA Civic Association's Neighbors Night Out event, and the UA Historical Society's History Speaks series.

Applications will be accepted through Friday, December 13, 2024. Successful applicants will be announced at the January 23, 2025 Community Relations Committee Meeting.

Columbia Gas Projects Slated for UA

Some major infrastructure upgrades by Columbia Gas are anticipated for UA, starting in 2025. This work will include the replacement of old gas lines with new, federally mandated 20-inch diameter steel pipes with safety features. These pipes are designed to service a large geographic area that extends beyond Upper Arlington's borders.

As part of a first phase of work, Columbia Gas plans to construct a new utility station on Ridgeview Road, replacing an existing single-family home located at 1336 Ridgeview Road. A public meeting for nearby neighbors was held mid-October. The building must adhere to City zoning requirements, so that the design, operation and maintenance blends with the surrounding neighborhood. To that end, the proposed structure must be reviewed and approved by the Board of Zoning and Planning (dates to be determined), a process that includes opportunities for public comment.

As Columbia Gas finalizes its plans, a series of public meetings will be scheduled for each phase of work.

CITY MANAGER UPDATE Steve Schoeny

Where Do We Go From Here - a Five Year Look Back and a Look Forward

"Where do we go from here? I don't know. Ok. So, these are not the most inspirational words from your new City Manager." This was my first message to the community in October 2019. You have been bearing with me for five years, so I want to take a look back at where we have been and give you a preview of how we are charting the map for the next 25 years.

The last five years have been a period of unprecedented redevelopment:

- Arlington Gateway, Westmont at the Lane, OhioHealth Neurology, TownPlace Suites and several other projects are all new on Lane Avenue.
- At Kingsdale, the old Macy's building has been replaced by more than \$200 million in new investment, including the Bob Crane Community Center.
- The former CompuServe
 Headquarters is home to a
 successful and growing corporate
 group led by GOSH Enterprises,
 with more than \$8 million in
 improvements.
- In total, Upper Arlington has seen \$1.21 billion in investment over the last five years.

At the same time, we have been investing in our infrastructure.

- McCoy, most of Northwest and Fishinger west of Five Points all have completely rebuilt roads and new underground infrastructure.
- We have new playgrounds at Miller, Oxford, Reed Road and Thompson parks.

- We have rebuilt the infrastructure that runs Devon Pool and made major repairs to the pool itself.
- We are rebuilding Northam Park, regrading the fields, installing irrigation, rebuilding the tennis courts, adding pickleball, and upgrading the park service building.

We have invested in our safety forces, adding positions and upgrading equipment.

We have built new partnerships with community organizations to foster a sense of belonging. Neighbor's Night Out, the Culture & Artisans Fair, the hUmAn Connections Festival, History Speaks and UA Pride were all supported by grants through our Community Relations Committee. We have created new events like Arts on Arlington.

I could go on about what we have accomplished, but I want to turn our attention to the future.

In 2025, the City will start the process of building a new master plan - the City's comprehensive long-range planning document. The City last did a major overhaul of its Master Plan from 2011-2013, building on the 2001 update.

The world has changed significantly, more change is coming, and Upper Arlington needs to be ready. We hope to design a master plan process that brings the community together around what Upper Arlington should be in 25-30 years.

The plan will focus on land use, but not as heavily as a typical master plan. We will already have strong, up-to-date plans for Lane Avenue, Henderson Road and the River Ridge neighborhood. I anticipate that the land use portion of the plan will focus on what we want if there are redevelopment proposals for streets like Northwest Blvd and Fishinger Rd., where you have a mix of residential and commercial properties. Within neighborhoods, we will consider the balance between property owner rights and neighborhood expectations. We will need to talk about things like carriage houses, mother-in-law suites and other accessory structures.

The master plan will also have a major emphasis on our parks. The Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan was created in 2018, and is ready for an update. Our plan is to fold this into the master plan process.

Perhaps most importantly, it will give us a chance to think strategically about our community values. Part of this process is making it clear how we - as a community and as a government institution - make decisions. Many plans are out of date before they are published, but they provide clear visions and values to guide decision making as the world changes. For governments, being clear about how you make decisions is critical because we rely on trust and, as the Declaration of Independence says, "the consent of the governed," for the very foundation of our existence.

One of the best ways to build that trust is participation. The master planning process will include many ways for you to participate. If the future of UA matters to you, start thinking about how you might want to be involved. We will bring the structure and some ideas to the table, but this plan has to be the community's plan.

While we are still about a year from beginning this process, I want to start preparing the community so that everyone is ready when the real work begins. Thank you for allowing me to serve this amazing community over the last five years. I look forward to working with you to help chart the path that will guide us for the next 25.

Spotted Lanternfly PARKS & REC | 614-583-530

The invasive Spotted Lanternfly, also known as SLF, has been found in 12 Ohio counties, including Franklin County. This non-native pest is currently in its adult stage and will remain active until winter. It feeds in large numbers on the sap of grapevines, trees, and other plants, causing damage like wilting, die back, and sooty mold. If you see a Spotted Lanternfly outside a quarantined area, take a photo and report it to the Ohio Department of Agriculture using the Ohio Plant Pest Reporter. Findings in or near known infestations don't need to be reported. Visit https://agri.ohio.gov/ divisions/plant-health/invasive-pests/ invasive-insects/slf for more.

Mosquito Study Program

The Ohio State University and Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) will be conducting a mosquito study in 2025 and 2026 to enhance efforts to effectively control mosquito populations while protecting our beneficial insects. The study is funded through USDA's Agriculture Food Research Initiative.

The call is out for volunteer households in UA to participate in the study. They need two types of participants: residents that are okay with the sprayed pesticide treatments conducted by FCPH, and residents who opt out. Leaf Collection

Public Works Division | 614-583-5350

The City is providing leaf collection services through early December, weather permitting. A Leaf Collection Tracking Map is available on the Leaf Collection section of our website, so that you can follow the progress of collection crews in your area and anticipate when they are likely to be on your street.

Please follow these guidelines:

- Place loose-raked leaves close to the edge of the street in the tree lawn, **not in the street**.
- Leaf piles should extend no further than two-three feet behind the curb.
- Do not place grass clippings, rocks, sticks or other objects in leaf piles - please continue to use the weekly yard waste collection service to dispose of other yard waste debris.
- Keep piles away from signposts, light poles, trees and mail boxes.
- Do not block storm sewers as this can increase the chance of flooding in the event of a heavy rain.
- Parked vehicles should be at least 15 feet away from either side of leaf piles so that collection crews have safe access to the leaves with their truck and leaf machine.
- The last day to rake leaves is Sunday, December 1.
- Once the program has ended, place leaves in approved biodegradable bags or trash cans clearly marked as "Yard Waste" and put them out for collection on your regular Solid Waste collection day.

Bring Us Your Pumpkins!

November 1-December 8

Don't throw away your pumpkins, compost them! Special pumpkin-only collection containers will be available at Fancyburg Park beginning Friday, November 1 through early December. Simply toss your pumpkins into the containers and they will be transported to a compost facility. Please DO NOT put any pumpkins in your curbside food waste containers or the food waste drop-off bins at the Municipal Services Center, Sunny 95 Park, and Fancyburg Park.

Holiday Lights Recycling Program

Available Through January 31 Public Works Division | 614-583-5350

Following the holidays, the City is offering a holiday light recycling program. Bins will be available at the Municipal Services Center, 3600 Tremont Road, at the rear of the building, near the food waste composting containers. Lights only please, no bags or other material. Light

strands should never be placed in the blue recycle containers as they are considered "tanglers" and can cause major issues within the recycling facility.

Holiday lights are also accepted year-round through the City's Electronic Waste Drop Off location, at 4100 Roberts Road.

Christmas Tree Collection

The City's Solid Waste provider, Local Waste, will collect live Christmas trees on your regular collection day as part of the yard waste collection program. Remove all decorations and place trees (do not place in bags) at the curb by 7 am. If the tree is eight feet or taller, please cut it in half.

Curbside Food Waste Composting Program

UA residents are encouraged to be part of our curbside food waste composting program, with new participants added each month. Once accepted into the program, you will receive a 5-gallon lidded container, and a roll of compostible liners. Scan the QR code for program details and to apply. Recycling Program Update

Effective November 1, the Rumpke recycling facility will now be accepting **CLEAR** plastic clamshells - the type of containers used for fruit, berries and lettuce. They can also accept clear plastic egg containers and carry out containers.

Nearly 10 years after the Upper Arlington community embarked on a facilities master planning process for Upper Arlington Schools that resulted in a new high school and all new or renovated elementary schools, it's time to come together again – to determine the best path forward for the district's aging middle schools and Burbank Early Childhood School.

"This is an exciting time in our community as we begin to work together again to determine the future of our schools," said Superintendent Robert Hunt, Ph.D. "Facilities master planning is a key part of our district's 2025-2030 strategic plan, which is in the process of being finalized, but it is critical that we begin this work now for these aging buildings."

The first phase of facilities master planning was an unprecedented community effort – with thousands of residents becoming involved and more than 8,000 touchpoints over the 2½ year process for all nine buildings. That

process began nearly a decade ago with physical assessments for each of the district's nine school buildings that helped to fully understand the needs of each building in the district.

"At the time, due to a bond issue in the 1990s that funded maintenance and repairs to Hastings and Jones, there were more urgent physical needs at the high school and elementary schools. As a result, the decision was made to delay any needed work on the middle schools and Burbank, because their most significant needs were approximately 10 years out," said Treasurer/CFO Andrew Geistfeld. "That brings us to today and the need to engage our community again to determine a fiscally responsible, long-term plan for these aging schools."

Just like the first phase of the master planning process, phase two will be driven by community engagement and feedback – unfolding over 1½ years and involving multiple opportunities for residents to get involved by joining a building team, attending a community

engagement session, taking an online survey and more.

"Our goal is to create a transparent process where all voices are heard," Dr. Hunt said. "We will work together to revisit the work that was done 10 years ago, explore all possible options and together determine the best path forward for these schools."

Upper Arlington Schools will kick off phase two this fall with the first round of community engagement sessions – on October 29 from 6:30-8 pm, at Jones Middle School, 2100 Arlington Avenue, and October 30 from 9-10:30 am, at the Graf Center, 2020 Builders Place.

"With the physical needs of these buildings, there is no zero-cost option or solution for our community," Dr. Hunt said. "Your voice truly matters in this process. Your feedback will be vital in identifying a fiscally responsible and forward-thinking plan that meets the needs of both our students and our community."

Focus On Students Is Threaded Through Key Initiatives For 2024-2025 School Year

As we move through the 2024-2025 school year, Upper Arlington Schools continues to build on its commitment to providing a high-quality education and fostering a supportive environment for all students. Whether it's through academic achievement, community engagement, or long-term planning, we are focused on creating opportunities that help our students thrive.

Strategic Planning Update

One of our key priorities this year is finalizing a new, comprehensive strategic plan that will guide Upper Arlington Schools through 2030.

After several months of work, the 70-plus volunteers involved in the process finalized strategy recommendations for three strategic priority areas – Engaged Learning, Culture and Climate, and Connections – each strengthened by a focus on continuous improvement through Excellence and Innovation. Their work was informed by more than 8,500 touchpoints – from the Listen Learn Lead events in the spring of 2023, the UAdventure tour and the equity audit conducted last fall, and finally the strategic planning feedback session in May.

This fall, our entire staff has been involved in the process to develop a cohesive and comprehensive implementation plan – or the specific action steps for each strategy and the data that will be analyzed to measure success. We have also been meeting with students for additional feedback to ensure that we are responsive to their needs in the development of this plan.

We will provide an update to the community on this work at our annual

town hall meeting on November 19 at 6 pm, in Upper Arlington High School's Amelita Mirolo Black Box Theater, 1625 Zollinger Road. I encourage you to join us to learn more.

Coffee & Conversation Series

This fall, we launched an expanded Coffee & Conversation series for the 2024-2025 school year. We have had a wonderful turnout from our community for the three coffee chats we have hosted so far this year, and we look forward to continuing the conversation as the school year progresses.

2023-2024 State Report Cards

In September, we received great news regarding our district's performance on the 2023-2024 state report cards. Upper Arlington Schools earned the highest possible overall rating of five stars, placing us among the top 18 districts in Ohio.

Even more impressively, we are one of just six districts in the entire state to have earned five stars in every category – achievement, progress, gap closing, graduation, and early literacy – for the third year in a row.

While we are pleased with these results, we understand that report cards represent only one measure of our success. Our focus remains on supporting the whole child, and we will continue to analyze data from multiple sources to ensure we are meeting the needs of our students. Look for more details in our 2025 Quality Profile, which will provide a broader look at student growth, achievement and well-being when it is released early next year.



Treasurer's Notes

This fall, Upper Arlington Schools is launching phase two of facilities master planning, focused on the aging middle



schools and Burbank Early Childhood School. This is an important time for our community as we begin to come together again to plan for the future of our schools, just as we did nearly a decade ago.

As we launch this communitydriven process for these three schools, it is also important to recognize our commitment to responsibly plan for future maintenance needs for the high school and five elementary schools that were part of phase one.

More than two years ago, the Board of Education established a capital project reserve fund to proactively plan for future maintenance needs for these six new and renovated buildings. This idea had been discussed during the facilities master planning process.

Since the 2022-2023 school year, the district has set aside \$750,000 in permanent improvement funding annually in this reserve fund to assist with the costs of eventual maintenance needs such as new HVAC systems or the replacement of a turf field once it has reached its expected lifespan.

This is an important example of our commitment to responsibly planning for future financial needs and being a good steward of our community's investment in our schools.

Five Year Forecast

In November, I will present the latest update to the five year forecast to the Board of Education at their regular meeting. This legally required document is an important check-in point for us as a district and for our community, as it offers a clear picture on the current state of district finances and our outlook over the next five years.

The November update to the five year forecast will reflect the continued enrollment growth we are experiencing in our schools, as well as the increasing needs for students to access specific educational programs in our district.

I will share more about the five year forecast in my next column, and following the Board meeting in November, you will also be able to take a closer look at the five year forecast on our website, www.uaschools.org/treasurer.

These academically talented members of the UAHS Class of 2025 are among more than 16,000 high school seniors nationwide to qualify as Semifinalists based on their scores on the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). The Semifinalists represent the highest scores on the PSAT/NMSQT and approximately one percent of high school seniors nationwide.

Beginning in February, the National Merit Scholarship program expects to

notify about 15,000 Semifinalists that they have advanced to Finalist status after fulfilling several requirements, including having a record of a high academic achievement in grades nine through 12 and earning a high score on the SAT or ACT. Approximately half of the Finalists will be awarded National Merit Scholarships and the Merit Scholar title.

UAHS Teacher Honored with National Award

Upper Arlington High School's **Diane Kahle, Ph.D.**, has been named a recipient of the Computer Science Teaching Association's Teaching Excellence Award for 2023-2024. She is among only 10 national winners of this award, which honors K-12 computer science educators who have made significant contributions in their roles to support the development of computer-science education and technology.

"Dr. Kahle is incredibly deserving of this award," said Upper Arlington High School Principal Andrew Theado. "Through authentic, real-world learning opportunities, she lights a spark for her students to explore the possibilities of a future in computer science."

A teacher for more than 30 years,

Dr. Kahle is passionate about creating computer science opportunities for Upper Arlington students from kindergarten through high school. Along with her students in the Computer Science Club, she brings Hour of Code activities to all elementary and middle schools. She leads volunteer opportunities for her students in computer science education through robotics and coding workshops for Girl Scouts. She also organizes a daylong

Hackathon each year for interested Upper Arlington High School students in partnership with Nationwide, connecting students with professionals in the computer science industry.

"A day for them to play with computer science and learn more in an authentic setting is just – I can't replace this with any other activity I do all year because it's so valuable for the kids," she said of the 2024 Hackathon in the spring.



Pleasant Litchford Memorial Garden Update

The Upper Arlington Board of Zoning and Planning has approved a conditional use application allowing Upper Arlington Schools to rebury the cremated remains of one individual in the Pleasant Litchford Memorial Garden at Upper Arlington High School. This small landscaped area in the south parking lot near the softball and baseball fields was formerly the site of the Litchford Family Cemetery.

The remains are of a young girl whose grave was missed when the cemetery was appropriated by the district in the 1950s. At that time, dozens of bodies were exhumed from the Litchford Family Cemetery and moved to other locations. However, in 2020 archeologists discovered that the grave of the young girl had been missed, leaving her buried at the high school site for nearly 60 years after the rest of the cemetery had been relocated.

Since that time, the school district



has been working with Litchford family descendants, the City of Upper Arlington and the Upper Arlington Historical Society to learn more about the young girl and to honor the life and legacy of Pleasant Litchford, who became one of the largest landowners in the area after being enslaved in Virginia in the 1800s (to learn more about Pleasant Litchford, please visit www.uaschools.org/litchford).

Because the young girl is unidentified, the school district and the descendant family felt it would be most respectful to return her remains to the site selected as her final resting place by her loved ones at the time of her death.

The district will work with the Litchford family descendants to identify a timeline for the reburial and additional ways to honor the history of the site.

- The Upper Arlington Bridge is an alternative to the traditional school setting for students who would benefit from individualized support to achieve their academic and personal goals.

In addition to these programs, Upper Arlington Schools also launched three additional programs this school year for students seeking alternate educational pathways and/or a college-level experience while in high school – the University of Cincinnati Early IT Program, powered by the PAST Foundation, a Semiconductor Program offered in partnership with Columbus State, and a Teaching Professions Pathway, led by an Upper Arlington High School educator. 

want to destroy the machine and its travelers. Bradley blends science fiction, historical fiction, romance, and action into an entertaining read for anyone seeking a unique story!




Diva: A Novel
